

San Francisco H1N1 Swine Flu Vaccination Events



The San Francisco Department of Public Health will be opening H1N1 Swine Flu Vaccination Events for high-risk groups.



Who can come to the public H1N1 swine flu vaccine sites?

Call your doctor first to see if they have vaccine. If they do not, the following high-risk groups can come to the H1N1 swine flu vaccine events:

- Pregnant women
- All people from 6 months through 24 years of age
- People who live with or provide care for infants less than 6 months of age
- Health care and emergency responders with direct patient contact
- Adults ages 25-64 with medical conditions that put them at risk for complications from influenza (heart, lung or kidney disease, asthma, diabetes, or weakened immune system)

When are the public H1N1 swine flu vaccine events?

The San Francisco Department of Public Health will operate vaccine sites for high-priority groups within 3 days of the vaccine arriving locally. Expected times of operation include:

October 29 - Thursday	4 pm – 7 pm
October 30 - Friday	4 pm – 7 pm
October 31 - Saturday	8 am – 12 pm (noon)

Cost

The H1N1 swine flu vaccine will be provided free of charge at vaccine sites.
