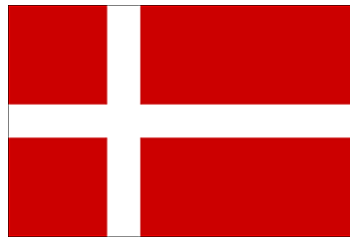


Danish School of Journalism

The Danish School of Journalism in Århus was inaugurated in 1973 and it is currently the only recognized professional journalism school in Denmark. It has received international recognition in recent years, in particular for contributing to the development of a free press in Central and Eastern Europe, and developing nations by means of new journalism courses. The Danish School of Journalism buildings are situated in the northern part of Århus and have all modern facilities such as classrooms, auditoriums, a library, computer rooms and studios for TV, radio, and photojournalism. The school has a staff of about 90 and about 1,100 students are enrolled for the four-year course.

Århus, Denmark

Århus is located on the east coast of the Jutland peninsula and it is the second largest city in Denmark. Founded by the Vikings in the year 1000, the city began to expand in 1900 because of industrialization. Greater Århus now has a population of half a million people, and the city's population is increasing steadily every year. The Danish School of Journalism is one of several Universities in Århus, so there is a high proportion of young people in the area. The City of Århus places great importance on preserving and protecting the environment. Public transportation and bikes are a high priority, and green parks fill the city. Conserving energy and recycling are also emphasized. Århus calls itself the "smallest big city in the world," due to its cultural wealth. Some of its cultural features include a lively music scene, many good discotheques, a casino, a variety of museum, art galleries, international cuisine, a vast number of sporting facilities, and bowling alleys. Århus is an excellent connection point to both the rest of Scandinavia and other parts of Europe. Århus is approximately four hours from Copenhagen by car and ferry.
