The San Francisco State University Police Department operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week, year round. There are trained emergency dispatchers that answer the phones 24 hours a day. There is always a police officer on duty who will respond to calls for assistance.

If you have questions or concerns regarding any information on this brochure, please contact the University Police Department at (415) 338-7200, or come by the Police Department building located on North State Drive.

Safety on Campus

San Francisco State University strives to:

- Create and maintain an environment for learning that promotes respect for and appreciation of scholarship, freedom, human diversity, and the cultural mosaic of the City of San Francisco and the Bay Area;
- Promote excellence in instruction and intellectual accomplishment and;
- Provide broadly accessible higher education for residents of the region and state, as well as the nation and the world.

The University Police Department participates in delivering the University mission and strives to create a safe environment conducive to academic excellence. Even though the University Police Department works closely with neighboring Police Agencies and employs security measures to reduce and prevent crime, we believe security is everyone's responsibility, and we need your assistance.

SF State is a community of more than 30,000 faculty, staff and students located in the City and County of San Francisco. In addition to the main campus, SF State maintains a downtown teaching center and remote research facilities located in Tiburon and Sattley, California. While we do not employ University Police officers at these locations, we maintain a collaborative and reporting relationship with the law enforcement agencies at these sites and will intervene if a security issue arises.

On the main campus, to minimize the number of criminal incidents, a competent Residence Life staff, professionally-trained University Police Officers, students, and members of the wider campus community participate in a number of shared responsibilities to insure that the students and their possessions are protected as much as possible.

Timely Warning Policy

On occasion, you will see timely warning notices describing recent crime trends or dangerous incidents. It is our policy to post these notices on the exterior doors of all campus buildings to provide our community with information about the incidents and crime prevention recommendations. Once all the relative information is received, these notices will typically be posted within 24 hours.

Policy for Reporting the Annual Disclosure of Crime Statistics

The University Police Department prepares this report to comply with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Crime Statistics Act. The full text of this report can be located on our web site at www.sfsu.edu/~upd. You will also be able to connect to our site via the SF State Home page at www.sfsu.edu. This report is prepared in cooperation with the Police agencies surrounding our main campus and our alternate sites, Housing and Residential Services, the Judicial Affairs Officer and the Division of Student Affairs. Each entity provides updated information on their educational efforts and programs to comply with the Act.

To comply with the Act, we collect crime statistics from local police agencies, by providing the addresses of off campus housing or off campus property either owned, or controlled by the University, or public property immediately adjacent to campus. All local police agencies, where SF State property is located or is nearby, provide automated statistics for the property and a radius around the property requested. These statistics may also include crimes that have occurred in private residences or businesses and is not required by law. The University does not recognize any off campus fraternity or sorority houses. Likewise, student organization recognition does not extend beyond the University, and student organizations are not recognized to engage in activity off-campus. In September of every year, an email is sent to all enrolled students that provides the web site address to access this report and the web address is included in the pay stubs of all faculty and staff. Copies of the report may also be obtained at the University Police Department at 1600 Holloway, S.F. CA. 94132 or by calling 415-338-2747. All prospective employees may obtain a copy from Human Resources in Administration 252 or by calling 415-338-1872, and the web site address will be attached to SF State employment applications. Directions to locate the report on the web site are located in the Class Schedule and University Bulletin.

Policies & Procedures Concerning Security, Access and Maintenance of Campus Facilities

All buildings except the library will be secured by the University Police Department by 11:00 P.M. on weekdays and by 5:30 P.M. on weekends per University Executive Order #94-17. We recognize that there will be some need for after hour and weekend access to buildings. After hours, a faculty or staff I.D. is required. Anyone working late or on weekends should notify the University Police Department. Students working in the building after hours are required to have in their possession a student pass (authorized by college deans), together with photo identification. Holiday access scheduling is treated as weekend access.

Access to University Housing facilities is limited to residents, escorted guests and University staff. Entry is monitored on a 24-hour basis through a combination of card-key security systems, hard keys, door prop alarms, and on-duty Residence Life personnel. The campus facilities are maintained by Plant Operations and patrolled by the officers of the University Police Department. The police officers and community service officers regularly test the emergency phones and submit work orders for repair, recommend the trimming of shrubbery for safety reasons and conduct periodic lighting surveys. Officers report the need for replacement of lights and any other physical hazards they notice. Periodic crime prevention surveys are conducted when a crime trend occurs or upon the physical changes of office space and equipment when requested by an administrator. All campus buildings are equipped with card key access and door alarms that report to the University Police Department. Many offices, labs, computer rooms and areas of campus have alarms.

Lighting improvements are constantly being evaluated. Improvements have included the placement of high intensity sodium vapor lights in buildings, in parking lot areas, in areas with heavy landscaping and trees, and along pathways frequently traveled by students. Outdoor courtesy telephones are located at the entrances of all University Housing facilities and at many locations throughout the campus. All emergency telephones are connected directly to the University Police Department.

Multi-Hazard Response Plan

As part of the University's Multi-Hazard response plan, there are "safety coordinators" on each floor of every building on campus. There is one "building coordinator" for each building and their names are listed in the front of the SF State Telephone Directory. The names are updated annually with each new publication. Evacuation drills for each building are completed annually, both during the day and evening. The safety coordinators assist the University Police Department in evacuating buildings in emergencies and identifying hazards in the buildings. Faculty, staff and students should report crimes and suspicious activities 24 hours a day to the University Police Department. Safety coordinators can be contacted if for some reason you choose not to call our office.

Reporting Criminal Offenses to SF State Other Than to the University Police

Students are encouraged to report any problems with the campus environment to the University Police Department, but we encourage reporting anywhere on campus you feel comfortable such as the Division of Student Affairs staff or any campus administrators. The University Police Department maintains an anonymous crime tip line at 415-338-3030. The University Police Department, Counseling and Psychological Services, and the Division of Student Affairs will accept confidential and anonymous reports of crimes for inclusion in the annual statistical report. It is our goal to provide assistance wherever the report is made to make sure we include the crime in our annual security report.

The University Police Department Your Community Policing Agency

Campus Law Enforcement Information

Campus safety and security is coordinated by the University Police Department, located on North State Drive, near Lot 20. The department is budgeted for a force of 38 sworn officers with full arrest powers and has 47 non-sworn support employees. Our police officers are graduates of the California Peace Officers Standards Training Academy and undergo continued training to upgrade their skills. All sworn officers have been trained in first aid and CPR and are authorized to enforce all regulations on the university campus and an immediate one-mile radius. In some instances police powers extend statewide. University Police officers are armed with firearms. They conduct foot, vehicular and bicycle patrols on campus and in the Residence Community 24-hours a day.

We enjoy a good working relationship with all neighboring police agencies. University Police officers also work very closely with the San Francisco Police Department, agencies near our branch sites, and other law enforcement agencies to assist them with incidents involving campus community members that may occur off campus.

Please promptly report all criminal incidents and medical emergencies to us

Potential criminal actions and any emergency on campus, including medical emergencies, should be reported directly to the University Police Department by dialing 9-1-1. Upon receipt of the call, the university police officers are dispatched immediately to the site of the complaint and have the authority to make arrests if necessary.

Crime Prevention Presentations Available

As part of the Student Affairs philosophy, Student Affairs staff, Housing and Residential Services along with the University Police Department and the S.A.F.E. Place, hold sessions each semester on topics including Personal Safety Awareness, Rape and Sexual Assault Prevention and the Prevention of Burglary and Vandalism. Workshops, group presentations and written materials are provided to on-campus housing residents each semester, focusing on community responsibilities and needs within the student living environment. Information on safety and security is provided to students and employees regularly through seminars, films, bulletins, and crime alerts, posters, brochures and University student newspapers.

Alcohol, Drugs and Weapons Policies

SF State complies with the Drug Free Workplace Act of 1990 and the Higher Education Act Section 120a. University police officers enforce laws regulating the use of alcoholic beverages and underage drinking. SF State is committed to maintaining a safe and healthy environment for the campus community. Alcohol and other drugs should not interfere with the University's educational mission. All SF State students, faculty members, staff members, and administrators are subject to local, state and federal laws regarding the unlawful possession, distribution or use of alcohol or illegal drugs.

The unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession or use of illegal drugs on the University campus or at any University-sponsored event off campus is prohibited. No one may use illegal substances or abuse legal substances, including alcohol, in a manner which impairs performance of assigned tasks. A complete description of these regulations is contained in University Executive Order 89-12 "Alcohol and Drug Policy" and University Executive Order 90-15 "Policy on Substance Abuse in the Workplace". Both policies are available on the SF State Home Page at www.sfsu.edu, at Human Resources, the University Police Department, the Office of the Vice President for Student Affairs and at CEASE (Creating Empowerment through Alcohol and Substance Abuse Education). The CEASE Program, 415-338-1203, provides culturally sensitive information about alcohol and other drugs to our diverse campus community; involves a collective of students who assist in creating a campus environment which reinforces healthy lifestyles; provides support services for students who are experiencing problems with substances; and educates students about the impact of both alcohol and other drug abuse.

Excessive use of alcohol and other drugs is a serious health problem in itself, but alcohol and drug abuse can also contribute to a host of other physical and mental health problems such as unwanted pregnancy, violent behavior, HIV infection and other sexually transmitted diseases and psychological depression.

The use of alcoholic beverages must be in compliance with California State Law and is strictly limited to persons 21 years of age or older. The possession, transportation, and/or consumption of alcohol by individuals under 21 years of age is strictly prohibited. Alcoholic beverages may not be consumed in public areas and must be concealed and not in plain view when transported in the Residence Community. Residents in the Residence Community under the age of 21 are not permitted to host guests or residents of any age who are in possession of alcohol in their room/apartment.

The University Police Department strictly enforces Federal and State laws, as well as the University's zero-tolerance policy, for the use and sale of illegal drugs. Violators are subject to University discipline, criminal prosecution and removal from University housing. Students engaging in the sale of illegal drugs will be expelled. Students found in violation of University alcohol, drug and weapons policies may be subject to academic probation, suspension or expulsion. Parents or guardians may be notified about any disciplinary violation involving alcohol or a controlled substance which has been committed by a student who is under the age of 21.

Employees in violation of the University alcohol and drug policies may be subject to corrective action or dismissal or be required to participate fully in an approved counseling or rehabilitation program. Applicable legal sanctions under local, State and Federal law for the unlawful possession or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol range from probation, diversion, imprisonment in the county jail for less than one year, to imprisonment in State Prison. A police officer can take the license from any driver suspected of driving under the influence of alcohol and drugs.

Firearms and other dangerous weapons of any kind are not permitted on campus or in the Residence Community. Intentional use, possession, or sale of firearms or any other dangerous weapon is strictly prohibited on campus by state law.

Safety and Security in the Residential Community Access and Maintenance

Core Campus

San Francisco State University offers two traditional residence halls and two multi-story apartment complexes, which provides on-campus housing for approximately 2250 students. All buildings are owned and managed by San Francisco State University. Security safeguards within the residence community include restricted access, video surveillance and external door prop alarm systems. Crime prevention programs include orientation workshops, individual floor meetings, residential community-wide presentations, and educational programs.

Professional Residence Directors and student Resident Assistants, who are all members of the University Housing staff, live on campus and provide 24-hour staff coverage. Student room doors should be locked at all times even when occupied. Residents with automobiles may park them in Lot 25 after purchasing a semester or daily permit. Most importantly, residents are reminded to observe building security procedures and to notify Residence Life staff or the University Police Department of any unfamiliar faces or unusual incidents within either the residence halls or apartments. In 2004, University Housing implemented an in-house program for alcohol and drug violations as well as in 2007 a program called Alcohol EDU.

All Residence Life staff members in the residence community undergo comprehensive training each semester for both prevention and response regarding safety and security issues. As part of their responsibility for campus security, both student and professional staff participate in lectures and seminars, including first aid and CPR training, associated with topics such as substance abuse, prevention of sexual assault, and community security.

Mary Ward and Mary Park Halls

The Residence Halls are primarily reserved for incoming freshmen. University Housing offers a wide variety of programs. Most rooms are double occupancy, and when requested ADA accessible single rooms. The rooms are furnished with a bed, closet space, desk, chair, and drawers, for each resident each room has a cable TV outlet providing basic cable programming, power outlets, phone jacks with one phone instrument, and 10baseT Ethernet jacks. Residents are allowed to bring or rent a small refrigerator and or microwave to use in their rooms. Each resident in the Halls is required to purchase a meal plan; 10, 15 or 19 meals a week.

Towers at Centennial Square

The "Towers" is a 15 story apartment building which houses first year students enrolled in Residential Learning Communities students. The apartments are fully furnished one or two bedroom double occupancy units with a kitchenette, living room and bathroom. Each bedroom has a cable TV outlet providing basic cable programming, power outlets, phone jacks with one phone instrument, and 10baseT Ethernet jacks for both residents. There is card access to the exterior doors and a 24 hour front desk.

Each building has a staff of student Resident Assistants and a full time professional Resident Director or Area Coordinator. Resident or Community Assistants are available to provide help in anything from roommate conflicts to directions on how to get the nearest supermarket. RAs work closely with their residents to make sure the residents are academically and socially successful.

Exterior doors are monitored with prop alarms, key and card access. Depending on the building, there are two to three Resident Assistants on duty each evening Sunday night through Thursday night and 24 hours starting Friday at 5pm to Monday mornings. Staff members provide evening rounds and enforce University and Housing Policy. There is one professional staff member on call every night.

The Village at Centennial Square

The Village at Centennial Square provides housing to 760 single, freshman and sophomore students at San Francisco State University. In addition, the Village community includes 12,000 square feet of retail space for restaurants and shops, as well as the Student Services Building and the student One Stop Office. The Village name reflects a philosophy of easy student access to services with its design approach of a low-rise profile, linked courtyards, canopied walking areas and numerous community activity and study areas.

The Village offers single and double occupancy rooms in its three bedroom apartments, and double occupancy rooms in the two bedroom apartments. Spaces are filled on a first come first served basis. Residents are first and second year students and must be enrolled at San Francisco State University, carrying a minimum of 12 semester units. All apartments are fully furnished and include basic cable programming, power outlets, phone jacks and internet jacks. Each apartment has a full kitchen with stove, refrigerator, dishwasher, microwave and garbage disposal. Handicapped accessible units are available throughout the complex.

Entrances to the Village are protected by a card access system that enables only residents or authorized personnel to open the doors.

In addition, the Village community includes a number of restaurants and student facilities, including the Student Services Building, the Village Fitness Center, Subway, Taza Wraps, the Village Market and Patelco Bank. The on-campus retail center provides students easy access to services and a neighborhood environment.

The Village has a residential life staff of a full-time professional live-in Area Coordinator, two assistant area coordinators and 16 RAs.

University Park South (Blocks, 1, 2, 5, 6, 41, and 42)

University Park South (UPS) is comprised of 262 multi family homes on the campus of San Francisco State University. The properties provide housing opportunities to students, faculty and staff of San Francisco State University as well as residents not affiliated with the University. The units vary in size (one, two and three bedroom units) and are constructed as low-rise profile, with linked courtyards, covered parking areas and common laundry rooms.

Block 41 offers 16 unfurnished three bedroom, two and one half bath town homes offered exclusively to faculty and staff of San Francisco State University. Spaces are filled on a first come first served basis.

Blocks 42, 1, 2, 5, and 6 offer 246 apartment homes open to faculty, staff and students. Spaces are filled on a first come, first serve basis.

All apartments at UPS are fully equipped and include power outlets, phone jacks and internet options. Each apartment has a full kitchen with stove, and refrigerators. Some apartment homes have dishwashers and garbage disposals.

Entrances to the Block 41 residences are accessible via Vidal Street, a public road maintained by the City of San Francisco.

Entrances to the Block 42 residences are accessible via Font Boulevard, Pinto Avenue and Arballo Drive.

Entrances to the Block 1 residences are accessible via Tapia Drive and Font Boulevard.

Entrances to the Block 2 residences are accessible via Holloway Avenue, Font Boulevard, Arellano Avenue and Serrano Drive.

Entrances to the Block 5 residences are accessible via Arellano Drive, Serrano Drive and Holloway Avenue.

Entrances to the Block 6 residences are accessible via Holloway Avenue, Varela Avenue, Serrano Drive and Cardenas Avenue.

All of University Park South is owned and managed by San Francisco State University, University Housing.

University Park North

University Park North (UPN) provides 697 unfurnished apartments to students, faculty, and staff of San Francisco State University in addition to residents of the area. The complex provides easy access to the Main Campus with a design of both low-rise and tower accommodations.

University Park North offers one, two and three bedroom apartments with linked common areas and are filled on a first come first served basis. Priority is given first to faculty and staff, next to students and finally to residents of the area.

All apartments are unfurnished and include basic cable programming, power outlets, phone jacks and accessible high speed internet options. Each apartment has a full kitchen with stove, refrigerator, dishwasher, microwave and garbage disposal.

Entrances to the University Park North towers are protected by a key system that enables only residents or authorized personnel to open the doors and have access to the building. Garden apartments are general entrances with private homes secured by individual front doors.

University Park North is owned by San Francisco State University and managed by Kennedy Wilson Properties, Incorporated.

Student Conduct

Students may be expelled, suspended or placed on probation for committing violent or criminal acts on campus or at campus-related events. In compliance with federal and state laws and regulations, victims of violent crimes, including sexual assault, are to be informed whenever information regarding disciplinary action taken by the university is included in a student's file. Within three days victims are to be informed of the results of the disciplinary action and any appeal. The victim is required to keep the results of the disciplinary action and appeal confidential. For further information, contact the Student Judicial Affairs Officer in the Office for the Vice President for Student Affairs by calling 338-2032.

Sexual Assault Policy

SF State recognizes that sexual assault is a serious issue, and will not tolerate acts of sexual assault on campus. The University will investigate all allegations of sexual assault and take appropriate disciplinary, criminal, or legal action, with prior consent of the victim.

As soon as convenient, the victim of a sexual assault should report the incident, including date or acquaintance rape to the University Police Department, the local police (if off-campus), university faculty or staff members, or The S.A.F.E. Place (Sexual Abuse Free Environment X87233). The victim should make every attempt to preserve any physical evidence of the assault. This may include a voluntary medical exam, not showering, or disposing of any damaged clothing, or other items that are present after/during the assault. Save clothing and/ or any other evidence in paper bags. Victims are encouraged to call any law enforcement agent by dialing 911 after a sexual assault for crime investigation, referral or transport for medical treatment, and referral to crisis counseling and legal advocacy.

The University Police, with the victim's consent, will immediately conduct a criminal investigation of a reported sexual assault. They will also contact a crisis-counselor immediately, if the victim wishes. Disciplinary actions may be imposed on recognized individual students, student organizations, and/or university faculty and staff found responsible for a sexual assault. University sanctions following campus disciplinary procedures depend on the outcome and may range from suspension to expulsion. Every effort will be made to criminally prosecute perpetrators of sexual assaults. The accuser and the accused are entitled to the same opportunities to have others present during a campus disciplinary proceeding and both shall be informed of the outcome of the proceeding.

After an alleged sexual assault incident occurs, the university will assist the victim in changing academic and living situations if so requested and if such changes are reasonably available.

If you become the victim of a sexual assault on or off campus:

- **GET** to a safe place
- **CONTACT** the University Police Department (or your local police) by dialing 911 or The SAFE Place at (415) 338-7233
- **DO NOT** shower, bathe, douche, change or destroy clothing, save clothing and other evidence in paper bag
- **DO NOT** straighten up the area
- **SEEK** medical attention from the Trauma Recovery/ Rape Treatment Center at SF General Hospital (415) 437-3000
- **SEEK** emotional support from local Rape Crisis Center such as SFWAR (415) 647-RAPE

Sexual Assault Response Team (SART)

“The Mission of SART is: to counter the experience of sexual assault with a sensitive and competent multi-disciplinary response, to support efforts to restore well being to the victim and to bring responsible person(s) to justice.” (California SART Manual, 2003). SART members consist of representatives of various campus departments: The SAFE Place, CEASE, University Police Department, University Housing, University Student Judicial Affairs (Student Discipline), Student Health Service Center, Counseling and Psychological Services Center. SART meets monthly to ensure smooth operations, problem solving and case review. SART is committed to effective case review to help identify and address trends, themes and system problems for the benefit of the sexual assault victim and the campus community.

Sexual Assault Investigation Team (SAIT)

The University Police Department responds to all reports of sexual assault. Officers conduct investigations, interview victims and suspects, collect evidence, testify in court, and refer victims to the appropriate services. All SAIT members have special training in sexual assault investigations.

The University Police Department will assist our community in notifying or obtaining services from the above and any authorities upon request.			

Counseling & Psychological Services Center

The University Police Department works closely with the Department of Counseling and Psychological Services Center (CPSC). We work as a team in dealing with sensitive situations, and we refer persons to the Counseling Center on a regular basis. Both university police officers and counselors have received training on threat assessments and the counselors consistently encourage their clients to report crimes to the University Police Department to prevent future crimes. Counseling sessions are considered confidential and privileged. The holder of the privilege is the client. Crime information can be forwarded anonymously at the request of the client. The counselors do not disclose information to the University Police without the consent of the client, unless there is an immediate threat to safety. Any reporting of statistics to comply with this act is done by reporting numbers and not names so the information provided by clients is confidential.

The Counseling Center provides brief therapy to students, staff, and faculty at no cost. The staff consists of culturally diverse, professionally trained and licensed counselors, psychologists, and clinical social workers. Counselors are also available for consultations regarding distressed or potentially violent students/employees and can be reached at (415) 338-2208.

In 2008, fourteen sexual assaults were reported to CPSC, five occurred in 2008, one incident occurred in 2006, another incident occurred in 2007, and a third was in the past. Thirteen of the incidents occurred off campus and one was reported as unknown for location, two notified county police department, and three notified other, one notified housing, three did not notify anyone, and five did not specify on the notification.

The S.A.F.E. Place

The SAFE Place (Sexual Abuse Free Environment) is the resource center for SF State students, staff, faculty and administrators who seek information, prevention services and crisis counseling/ intervention related to sexual assault, sexual harassment and domestic violence. We work with many campus groups, classes and student organizations to disseminate sexual violence prevention information. We have a Men's Program that creates leadership among men interested in ending violence against men and women. Some of our prevention efforts and campaigns in 2008 include: Clothesline Project for Domestic Violence Awareness Month, Transgender Remembrance Day, Turning Negative into Positive for Sexual Assault Awareness Month, T-shirt Wednesdays in which students wear a t-shirt that says "Men Can Stop Violence" throughout the school year. These events along with many other presentations on campus are provided in an effort to educate students and reduce the number of violent incidents occurring on campus. The SAFE Place is located in Students Services Building Room 205 and the coordinator can be reached at 338-7233.

In 2008 The SAFE Place had 29 contacts with students, staff, faculty and administrators who came to the office for help regarding a recent or past sexually violent experience. Of those 29 incidents 7 occurred on campus in 2008 including 3 cases of sexual harassment, 1 case of domestic violence, 1 hate crime based on sexual orientation, 1 stalking crime, 1 case sexual harassment online.

CEASE (Creating Empowerment through Alcohol and Substance Abuse Education)

The CEASE Program is a campus-wide alcohol and other drug education program created to educate students about alcohol and other drugs, to provide support services for all students grappling with substance related problems through assessment, counseling and referrals. The CEASE Program sponsors workshops and seminars, participates in on-campus information fairs, and additionally, provides training to volunteers who work with other students, faculty, and staff to assist in creating a campus environment that reinforces healthy lifestyles. We know that alcohol is the number one date rape drug and that close to all reported incidents of sexual assaults reported on campus have involved the use of alcohol by either or both the perpetrator and the victim. There continues to be societal acceptance that having sex with someone who is drunk is acceptable. Our prevention efforts work to challenge this notion and educate students to know that their ability to give and receive consent is compromised when too much alcohol is involved. CEASE is located in SSB 205 and the director can be reached at 338-7339.

Student Health Services Center

Student Health Services Center can provide initial urgent medical services to victims of sexual violence. The health center staff facilitate referrals to San Francisco Trauma Recovery/ Rape Treatment Center for forensic examinations and/or counseling. Appointments can be made by going to Student Health Services Center or by calling 338-1251.

Student Health Services reported 7 sexual assaults to the University Police Department in 2008. All victims were female, and all alleged assaults occurred off campus. Two assaults were perpetrated by an acquaintance of the victim; two assaults perpetrated by a person the victim met at an event the same night of the assault; three assaults were perpetrated by a stranger to the victim."

C.A.R.E.

The University Police Department provides an escort program called C.A.R.E. (Campus Alliance for A Risk-Free Environment). C.A.R.E. team members provide personal escorts and additional building security during evening and nighttime hours. Team members are available to escort students, faculty, and staff to and from their classroom, laboratory or office, automobile, campus housing, or any other location within a reasonable distance to campus. The C.A.R.E. program is a student security program, which supplements the police force. Call x87200 or (415) 338-7200 for an escort.

Hate Crimes

"Hate violence" as defined in the statute "means any act of physical intimidation or physical harassment, physical force or physical violence, or the threat of physical force or physical violence, that is directed against any person or group of persons because of the ethnicity, race, national origin, religion, sex, sexual orientation, disability, or political/religious beliefs of that person or group". Incidents of hate violence can be reported to the University Police Department, Counseling and Psychological Services, Student Discipline Office, and The S.A.F.E. Place. The University does not condone hate violence and is charged with ensuring that the rights guaranteed by state law and the U.S. Constitution are protected for all people regardless of their ethnicity, race, national origin, religion, sex, sexual orientation, disability, or political/religious beliefs.

Available Crime Prevention Presentations and Prevention of Violence in the Workplace

San Francisco State University has established a team of individuals to respond and provide training to prevent or recognize early warning signs of potential violence. The team consists of members from the University Police Department, Counseling & Psychological Services, Human Resources and the Dean of Students Office. Individual consultations, counseling, presentations, and workshops are offered on a consistent basis. Requests can be made by calling extensions x82747, x86100, x81872 or x82032.

Established University faculty, staff, and the University Police Department procedures will serve as the mechanisms for resolving situations of violence or threats of violence. Each allegation of violence will be taken seriously. Individuals are encouraged to report acts of violence, threats of violence, or any other behavior which by intent, act or outcome harms another person.

Members of the University Police Department are available any time to provide the following presentations to staff, faculty and students: Personal Safety, Sexual Assault Prevention, Prevention of Auto Theft and Auto Burglary, Dealing with Distressed Individuals, Emergency Preparedness, Rape Aggression Defense (RAD) Self Defense, Safety Presentations to Children and Parents, Laptop Safety, Fraud Prevention, Public Transportation Safety, Senior Citizen Safety, and any other topics related to protecting personal and state property. In addition, the University Police Department actively promotes a "Double UP For Safety" program, Wait for the Green Traffic Safety, Buckle Up for Safety which is a campaign designed to encourage the use of seat belts for children, and Parking Lot Safety.

We do encourage participation in our crime prevention programs and ask for your assistance in keeping our community safe.

Convicted Sexual Offender Registration Laws

Effective October 28, 2002, Penal Code 290.1 was expanded and requires sexual offenders to register with the University Police. Convicted sexual offenders are required to register under Section 290 if they are residing on the university campus; enrolled as a student of the university; employed by the university, either full-time or part-time (includes paid employees or volunteers); or working or carrying on a vocation at the university (e.g. contractors) for more than 14 days or for an aggregate period exceeding 30 days in a calendar year (including paid workers as well as volunteers). Persons listed above must register with the University Police within five working days of commencing enrollment or employment with the University. Registrants are also required to notify the university police with five working days of ceasing to be enrolled or employed, or ceasing to carry on a vocation at the University.

AB 1313 amended 290.01 (d)(1) which allows sex offender registration information to be released to member of the campus community by campus police.

The University Police Department prepares this report to comply with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Crime Statistics Act. The full text of this report can be located on our web site at www.sfsu.edu/~upd. You will also be able to connect to our site via the SF State Home page at www.sfsu.edu. This report is prepared upon receiving crime statistics from the San Francisco Police Department, the Judicial Affairs Officer and the Division of Student Affairs. Each entity provides updated information on their educational efforts and programs to comply with the Act.

In September of every year, an email is sent to all enrolled students that provides the web site address to access this report and the web address is included in the pay stubs of all faculty and staff. Copies of the report may also be obtained at the University Police Department at 1600 Holloway, S.F. CA. 94132 or by calling 415-338-2747. All prospective employees may obtain a copy from Human Resources in Administration 252 or by calling 415-338-1872, and the web site address will be attached to SF State employment applications. Directions to locate the report on the web site are located in the Class Schedule and university Bulletin.

Students, staff and faculty, are encouraged to report any problems with the Downtown Center to the Building Security, Downtown Center Administration, and to the University Police Department. We encourage reporting anywhere on campus you feel comfortable

such as the Division of Student Affairs staff or any campus administrators. The University Police Department maintains an anonymous crime tip line at 415-338-3030. The University Police Department, Counseling and Psychological Services, and the Division of Student Affairs will accept confidential and anonymous reports of crimes for inclusion in the annual statistical report. It is our goal to provide assistance wherever the report is made to make sure we include the crime in our annual security report.

The Downtown Center office is open from 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM, Monday through Friday. Classes are held until 10:00 PM on Monday through Friday and Saturdays from 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM. The building doors are secured shortly after the end of classes by building security. On Saturdays, a lab employee is available in an office on the second floor for any problems related to equipment. If you would like to report a hazard or make a recommendation on improving security or maintenance at the Downtown Center, call 415-495-7333.

Campus Law Enforcement Information

Campus safety and security is coordinated by the University Police Department, located on North State Drive, near Lot 20 on the Main Campus. The department is budgeted for a force of 38 sworn officers with full arrest powers and has 47 non-sworn support employees. Our police officers are graduates of the California Peace Officers Standards Training Academy and undergo continued training to upgrade their skills. All sworn officers have been trained in first aid and CPR and are authorized to enforce all regulations on the university campus and an immediate one-mile radius. In some instances police powers extend statewide. University Police officers are armed with firearms. They conduct foot, vehicular and bicycle patrols on campus and in the Residence Community 24-hours a day.

We enjoy a good working relationship with all neighboring police agencies. University Police officers also work very closely with the San Francisco Police Department, agencies near our branch sites, and other law enforcement agencies to assist them with incidents involving campus community members that may occur off the main campus.

Crime Prevention Presentations Available

As part of the Student Affairs philosophy, Student Affairs staff, Housing and Residential Services along with the University Police Department and the S.A.F.E. Place, hold sessions each semester on topics including personal safety awareness, rape and sexual assault prevention, and the prevention of burglary and vandalism. Workshops, group presentations and written materials are provided to on-campus housing residents each semester, focusing on community responsibilities and needs within the student living environment. Information on safety and security is provided to students and employees regularly through seminars, films, bulletins, and crime alerts, posters, brochures and university student newspapers.

Drugs, Alcohol and Weapons

SF State Complies with the Drug Free Workplace Act of 1990 and the Higher Education Act Section 120a.

University police officers enforce laws regulating the use of alcoholic beverages and underage drinking. SF State is committed to maintaining a safe and healthy environment for the campus community. Alcohol and other drugs should not interfere with the University's educational mission. All SF State students, faculty members, staff members, and administrators are subject to local, state and federal laws regarding the unlawful possession, distribution or use of alcohol or illegal drugs.

The unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession or use of illegal drugs on the University campus or at any University-sponsored event off campus is prohibited. No one may use illegal substances or abuse legal substances, including alcohol, in a manner which impairs performance of assigned tasks. A complete description of these regulations is contained in University Executive Order 89-12 "Alcohol and Drug Policy" and University Executive Order 90-15 "Policy on Substance Abuse in the Workplace". Both policies are available on the SFSU Home Page at www.sfsu.edu and at Human Resources, the University Police Department, and the Office of the Vice President for Student Affairs and CEASE (Creating Empowerment through Alcohol and Substance Abuse Education). The CEASE Program, 415-338-1203, provides culturally sensitive information about alcohol and other drugs to our diverse campus community; involves a collective of students who assist in creating a campus environment which reinforces healthy lifestyles; provides support services for students who are experiencing problems with substances; and educates students about the impact of both alcohol and other drug abuse.

Excessive use of alcohol and other drugs is a serious health problem in itself, but alcohol and drug abuse can also contribute to a host of other physical and mental health problems such as unwanted pregnancy, violent behavior, HIV infection and other sexually transmitted diseases and psychological depression.

The use of alcoholic beverages must be in compliance with California State Law and is strictly limited to persons 21 years of age or older. The possession, transportation, and/or consumption of alcohol by individuals under 21 years of age is strictly prohibited. Alcoholic beverages may not be consumed in public areas and must be concealed and not in plain view when transported in the Residence Community. Residents in the Residence Community under the age of 21 are not permitted to host guests or residents of any age who are in possession of alcohol in their room/apartment.

The University Police Department strictly enforces Federal and State laws, as well as the University's zero-tolerance policy, for the use and sale of illegal drugs. Violators are subject to university discipline, criminal prosecution and removal from University housing. Students engaging in the sale of illegal drugs will be expelled. Students found in violation of University alcohol, drug and weapons policies may be subject to academic probation, suspension or expulsion. Parents or guardians may be notified about any disciplinary violation involving alcohol or a controlled substance which has been committed by a student who is under the age of 21.

Employees in violation of the University alcohol and drug policies may be subject to corrective action or dismissal or be required to participate fully in an approved counseling or rehabilitation program. Applicable legal sanctions under local, State and Federal law for the unlawful possession or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol range from probation, diversion, imprisonment in the county jail for less than one year, to imprisonment in State Prison. A police officer can take the license from any driver suspected of driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs.

Firearms and other dangerous weapons of any kind are not permitted at the Downtown Center, main Campus or in the Residence Community. Intentional use, possession, or sale of firearms or any other dangerous weapon is strictly prohibited on campus by state law.

Student Conduct

Students may be expelled, suspended or placed on probation for committing violent or criminal acts on campus or at campus-related events. In compliance with federal and state laws and regulations, victims of violent crimes, including sexual assault, are to be informed whenever information regarding disciplinary action taken by the university is included in a student’s file. Within three days victims are to be informed of the results of the disciplinary action and any appeal. The victim is required to keep the results of the disciplinary action and appeal confidential. For further information, contact the Student Judicial Affairs Officer in the Office for the Vice President for Student Affairs by calling 338-2032.

Sexual Assault Policy

SF State recognizes that sexual assault is a serious issue, and will not tolerate acts of sexual assault on campus. The University will investigate all allegations of sexual assault and take appropriate disciplinary, criminal, or legal action, with prior consent of the victim.

As soon as convenient, the victim of a sexual assault should report the incident, including date or acquaintance rape to the University Police Department, the local police (if off-campus), university faculty or staff members, or The S.A.F.E. Place (Sexual Abuse Free Environment X87233). The victim should make every attempt to preserve any physical evidence of the assault. This may include a voluntary medical exam, not showering, or disposing of any damaged clothing, or other items that are present after/during the assault. Save clothing and/ or any other evidence in paper bags. Victims are encouraged to call any law enforcement agent by dialing 911 after a sexual assault for crime investigation, referral or transport for medical treatment, and referral to crisis counseling and legal advocacy.

The University Police, with the victim’s consent, will immediately conduct a criminal investigation of a reported sexual assault. They will also contact a crisis-counselor immediately, if the victim wishes. Disciplinary actions may be imposed on recognized individual students, student organizations, and/or university faculty and staff found responsible for a sexual assault. University sanctions following campus disciplinary procedures depend on the outcome and may range from suspension to expulsion. Every effort will be made to criminally prosecute perpetrators of sexual assaults. The accuser and the accused are entitled to the same opportunities to have others present during a campus disciplinary proceeding and both shall be informed of the outcome of the proceeding.

After an alleged sexual assault incident occurs, the university will assist the victim in changing academic and living situations if so requested and if such changes are reasonably available.

If you become the victim of a sexual assault on or off campus:

- **GET** to a safe place
- **CONTACT** the University Police Department (or your local police) by dialing 911 or The SAFE Place at (415) 338-7233
- **DO NOT** shower, bathe, douche, change or destroy clothing, save clothing and other evidence in paper bag
- **DO NOT** straighten up the area
- **SEEK** medical attention from the Trauma Recovery/ Rape Treatment Center at SF General Hospital (415) 437-3000
- **SEEK** emotional support from local Rape Crisis Center such as SFWAR (415) 647-RAPE

Sexual Assault Response Team (SART)

“The Mission of SART is: to counter the experience of sexual assault with a sensitive and competent multi-disciplinary response, to support efforts to restore well being to the victim and to bring responsible person(s) to justice.” (California SART Manual, 2003). SART

and Psychological Services Center. SART meets monthly to ensure smooth operations, problem solving and case review. SART is committed to effective case review to help identify and address trends, themes and system problems for the benefit of the sexual assault victim and the campus community.

Sexual Assault Investigation Team (SAIT)

The University Police Department responds to all reports of sexual assault. Officers conduct investigations, interview victims and suspects, collect evidence, testify in court, and refer victims to the appropriate services. All SAIT members have special training in sexual assault investigations.

Counseling & Psychological Services Center

The University Police Department works closely with the Department of Counseling and Psychological Services Center (CPSC). We work as a team in dealing with sensitive situations, and we refer persons to the Counseling Center on a regular basis. Both university police officers and counselors have received training on threat assessments and the counselors consistently encourage their clients to report crimes to the University Police Department to prevent future crimes. Counseling sessions are considered confidential and privileged. The holder of the privilege is the client. Crime information can be forwarded anonymously at the request of the client. The counselors do not disclose information to the University Police without the consent of the client, unless there is an immediate threat to safety. Any reporting of statistics to comply with this act is done by reporting numbers and not names so the information provided by clients is confidential.

The Counseling Center provides brief therapy to students, staff, and faculty at no cost. The staff consists of culturally diverse, professionally trained and licensed counselors, psychologists, and clinical social workers. Counselors are also available for consultations regarding distressed or potentially violent students/employees and can be reached at (415) 338-2208.

In 2008, fourteen sexual assaults were reported to CPSC, five occurred in 2008, one incident occurred in 2006, another incident occurred in 2007, and a third was in the past. Thirteen of the incidents occurred off campus and one was reported as unknown for location, two notified county police department, and three notified other, one notified housing, three did not notify anyone, and five did not specify on the notification.

The S.A.F.E. Place

The SAFE Place (Sexual Abuse Free Environment) is the resource center for SF State students, staff, faculty and administrators who seek information, prevention services and crisis counseling/ intervention related to sexual assault, sexual harassment and domestic violence. We work with many campus groups, classes and student organizations to disseminate sexual violence prevention information. We have a Men's Program that creates leadership among men interested in ending violence against men and women. Some of our prevention efforts and campaigns in 2008 include: Clothesline Project for Domestic Violence Awareness Month, Transgender Remembrance Day, Turning Negative into Positive for Sexual Assault Awareness Month, T-shirt Wednesdays in which students wear a t-shirt that says "Men Can Stop Violence" throughout the school year. These events along with many other presentations on campus are provided in an effort to educate students and reduce the number of violent incidents occurring on campus. The SAFE Place is located in Students Services Building Room 205 and the coordinator can be reached at 338-7233.

In 2008 The SAFE Place had 29 contacts with students, staff, faculty and administrators who came to the office for help regarding a recent or past sexually violent experience. Of those 29 incidents 7 occurred on campus in 2008 including 3 cases of sexual harassment, 1 case of domestic violence, 1 hate crime based on sexual orientation, 1 stalking crime, 1 case sexual harassment online.

CEASE (Creating Empowerment through Alcohol and Substance Abuse Education)

The CEASE Program is a campus-wide alcohol and other drug education program created to educate students about alcohol and other drugs, to provide support services for all students grappling with substance related problems through assessment, counseling and referrals. The CEASE Program sponsors workshops and seminars, participates in on-campus information fairs, and additionally, provides training to volunteers who work with other students, faculty, and staff to assist in creating a campus environment that reinforces healthy lifestyles. We know that alcohol is the number one date rape drug and that close to all reported incidents of sexual assaults reported on campus have involved the use of alcohol by either or both the perpetrator and the victim. There continues to be societal acceptance that having sex with someone who is drunk is acceptable. Our prevention efforts work to challenge this notion and educate students to know that their ability to give and receive consent is compromised when too much alcohol is involved. CEASE is located in SSB 205 and the director can be reached at 338-7339.

Student Health Services Center

Student Health Services Center can provide initial urgent medical services to victims of sexual violence. The health center staff facilitate referrals to San Francisco Trauma Recovery/ Rape Treatment Center for forensic examinations and/or counseling. Appointments can be made by going to Student Health Services Center or by calling 338-1251.

Student Health Services reported 7 sexual assaults to the University Police Department in 2008. All victims were female, and all alleged assaults occurred off campus. Two assaults were perpetrated by an acquaintance of the victim; two assaults perpetrated by a person the victim met at an event the same night of the assault; three assaults were perpetrated by a stranger to the victim."

This report is prepared upon receiving crime statistics from the Marin County Sheriff's Department, the Judicial Affairs Officer and the Division of Student Affairs. Campus. The department is budgeted for a force of 38 sworn officers with full arrest powers and has 47 non-sworn support employees. Our police officers are graduates of the California Peace Officers Standards Training Academy and undergo continued training to upgrade their skills. All sworn officers have been trained in first aid and CPR and are authorized to enforce all regulations on the university campus and an immediate one-mile radius. In some instances police powers extend statewide. University Police officers are armed with firearms. They conduct foot, vehicular and bicycle patrols on campus and in the Residence Community 24-hours a day.

We enjoy a good working relationship with all neighboring police agencies. University Police officers also work very closely with the San Francisco Police Department, agencies near our branch sites, and other law enforcement agencies to assist them with incidents involving campus community members that may occur off campus.

Crime Prevention Presentations Available

As part of the Student Affairs philosophy, Student Affairs staff, Housing and Residential Services along with the University Police Department and the S.A.F.E. Place, hold sessions each semester on topics including personal safety awareness, rape and sexual assault prevention, and the prevention of burglary and vandalism. Workshops, group presentations and written materials are provided to on-campus housing residents each semester, focusing on community responsibilities and needs within the student living environment. Information on safety and security is provided to students and employees regularly through seminars, films, bulletins, and crime alerts, posters, brochures and university student newspapers.

Drugs, Alcohol and Weapons

SF State Complies with the Drug Free Workplace Act of 1990 and the Higher Education Act Section 120a.

University police officers enforce laws regulating the use of alcoholic beverages and underage drinking. SF State is committed to maintaining a safe and healthy environment for the campus community. Alcohol and other drugs should not interfere with the University's educational mission. All SF State students, faculty members, staff members, and administrators are subject to local, state and federal laws regarding the unlawful possession, distribution or use of alcohol or illegal drugs.

The unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession or use of illegal drugs on the University campus or at any University-sponsored event off campus is prohibited. No one may use illegal substances or abuse legal substances, including alcohol, in a manner which impairs performance of assigned tasks. A complete description of these regulations is contained in University Executive Order 89-12 "Alcohol and Drug Policy" and University Executive Order 90-15 "Policy on Substance Abuse in the Workplace". Both policies are available on the SF State Home Page at www.sfsu.edu and at Human Resources, the University Police Department, and the Office of the Vice President for Student Affairs and CEASE (Creating Empowerment through Alcohol and Substance Abuse Education). The CEASE Program, 415-338-1203, provides culturally sensitive information about alcohol and other drugs to our diverse campus community; involves a collective of students who assist in creating a campus environment which reinforces healthy lifestyles; provides support services for students who are experiencing problems with substances; and educates students about the impact of both alcohol and other drug abuse.

Excessive use of alcohol and other drugs is a serious health problem in itself, but alcohol and drug abuse can also contribute to a host of other physical and mental health problems such as unwanted pregnancy, violent behavior, HIV infection and other sexually transmitted diseases and psychological depression.

The use of alcoholic beverages must be in compliance with California State Law and is strictly limited to persons 21 years of age or older. The possession, transportation, and/or consumption of alcohol by individuals under 21 years of age is strictly prohibited. Alcoholic beverages may not be consumed in public areas and must be concealed and not in plain view when transported in the Residence Community. Residents in the Residence Community under the age of 21 are not permitted to host guests or residents of any age who are in possession of alcohol in their room/apartment.

The University Police Department strictly enforces Federal and State laws, as well as the University's zero-tolerance policy, for the use and sale of illegal drugs. Violators are subject to university discipline, criminal prosecution and removal from University housing. Students engaging in the sale of illegal drugs will be expelled. Students found in violation of University alcohol, drug and weapons policies may be subject to academic probation, suspension or expulsion. Parents or guardians may be notified about any disciplinary violation involving alcohol or a controlled substance which has been committed by a student who is under the age of 21.

Employees in violation of the university alcohol and drug policies may be subject to corrective action or dismissal or be required to participate fully in an approved counseling or rehabilitation program. Applicable legal sanctions under local, State and Federal law for the unlawful possession or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol range from probation, diversion, imprisonment in the county jail for less than one year, to imprisonment in State Prison. A police officer can take the license from any driver suspected of driving under the influence of alcohol and drugs.

Firearms and other dangerous weapons of any kind are not permitted at the Downtown Center or Main Campus, or in the Residence Community. Intentional use, possession, or sale of firearms or any other dangerous weapon is strictly prohibited on campus by state law.

Student Conduct

Students may be expelled, suspended or placed on probation for committing violent or criminal acts on campus or at campus-related events. In compliance with federal and state laws and regulations, victims of violent crimes, including sexual assault, are to be informed whenever information regarding disciplinary action taken by the university is included in a student's file. Within three days victims are to be informed of the results of the disciplinary action and any appeal. The victim is required to keep the results of the disciplinary action and appeal confidential. Sexual Assault Policy

SF State recognizes that sexual assault is a serious issue, and will not tolerate acts of sexual assault on campus. The University will investigate all allegations of sexual assault and take appropriate disciplinary, criminal, or legal action, with prior consent of the victim.

As soon as convenient, the victim of a sexual assault should report the incident, including date or acquaintance rape to the University Police Department, the local police (if off-campus), university faculty or staff members, or The S.A.F.E. Place (Sexual Abuse Free Environment X87233). The victim should make every attempt to preserve any physical evidence of the assault. This may include a voluntary medical exam, not showering, or disposing of any damaged clothing, or other items that are present after/during the assault. Save clothing and/ or any other evidence in paper bags. Victims are encouraged to call any law enforcement agent by dialing 911 after a sexual assault for crime investigation, referral or transport for medical treatment, and referral to crisis counseling and legal advocacy.

The University Police, with the victim's consent, will immediately conduct a criminal investigation of a reported sexual assault. They will also contact a crisis-counselor immediately, if the victim wishes. Disciplinary actions may be imposed on recognized individual students, student organizations, and/or university faculty and staff found responsible for a sexual assault. University sanctions following campus disciplinary procedures depend on the outcome and may range from suspension to expulsion. Every effort will be made to criminally prosecute perpetrators of sexual assaults. The accuser and the accused are entitled to the same opportunities to have others present during a campus disciplinary proceeding and both shall be informed of the outcome of the proceeding.

After an alleged sexual assault incident occurs, the university will assist the victim in changing academic and living situations if so requested and if such changes are reasonably available.

If you become the victim of a sexual assault on or off campus:

- **GET** to a safe place
- **CONTACT** the University Police Department (or your local police) by dialing 911 or The SAFE Place at (415) 338-7233
- **DO NOT** shower, bathe, douche, change or destroy clothing, save clothing and other evidence in paper bag
- **DO NOT** straighten up the area
- **SEEK** medical attention from the Trauma Recovery/ Rape Treatment Center at SF General Hospital (415) 437-3000
- **SEEK** emotional support from local Rape Crisis Center such as SFWAR (415) 647-RAPE

Sexual Assault Response Team (SART)

"The Mission of SART is: to counter the experience of sexual assault with a sensitive and competent multi-disciplinary response, to support efforts to restore well being to the victim and to bring responsible person(s) to justice." (California SART Manual, 2003). SART members consist of representatives of various campus departments: The SAFE Place, CEASE, University Police Department, University Housing, University Student Judicial Affairs (Student Discipline), Student Health Service Center, Counseling and Psychological Services Center. SART meets monthly to ensure smooth operations, problem solving and case review. SART is committed to effective case review to help identify and address trends, themes and system problems for the benefit of the sexual assault victim and the campus community.

Sexual Assault Investigation Team (SAIT)

The University Police Department responds to all reports of sexual assault. Officers conduct investigations, interview victims and suspects, collect evidence, testify in court, and refer victims to the appropriate services. All SAIT members have special training in sexual assault investigations.

- Access path key***
- Accessible Route—This path generally conforms to accessibility standards.
 - Areas that may be a travel hazard (where the slope exceeds the standard maximum ramp slope [8.3%], or the cross-slope is significant [exceeds 4%]).
 - Ramp (5%–8.3%)—Complying ramp along the accessible route.
 - Partially Accessible Route—This path generally conforms to accessibility standards, but there may be excessive cross-slope (over 2%) or other irregularities in a portion of the path, often along the path edge. There is usually a 48" wide complying path along these routes, though it may not be a straight or direct line.
 - Lighter shade indicates path continues underneath overhang.

*Note: The map and information on pathways are limited by the scale. The accessible route should be clear to a person at a location, while the dashed line is intended to indicate where keener observation may be necessary to locate the accessible route. Pathways are generally asphalt and subject to weathering, erosion, uplifting, and other changes that may create navigational issues. SFSU is committed to maintaining the accessible route.
